by facilitating the telling of our sector's stories. Our main vehicle for this was the 2008 Pillar Community Innovation Awards. The event inspired others to get involved in our community and provided \$10,000 in awards to local charities.

Pillar seeks to maximize the effectiveness of London's nonprofit sector by facilitating connections and collaboration among our members, as well as promoting best practices and ways to increase efficiencies. Acting on this, we launched a partnership between London, Windsor, and Kitchener-Waterloo to host a Community Action Forum to create inclusive and diverse nonprofit organizations.

Of course, member service is of primary importance to Pillar. We were encouraged and delighted to see that, in response to our survey, 86.5% of our members rated the value of their membership as good or excellent, with the top 3 benefits being our e-newsletter, posting volunteer opportunities, and professional development. In response to member need, we also developed a group benefits and insurance program with Stevenson & Hunt to offer exclusive rates and coverage options to Pillar members. More nonprofits and charities will be using these resources, as our membership rate has increased by 37%, putting us at a total of 166 members.

Our final strategic priority is to create a diversified funding strategy for Pillar. In addition to contributions from membership and grants, we have seen a gratifying response to our request for corporate support. This response has enabled us to create programs that strengthen the nonprofit sector and has allowed us to better serve our members.

With the completion of an exciting and successful year, Pillar is energized and eager to take on 2009. We will support and inspire our members in every way we can, while increasing the sustainability of Pillar Nonprofit Network. We look forward to building connections and encouraging collaboration between local nonprofits, promoting the recognition of volunteerism and shining a light on the important role our sector plays in making London such a great place to live.

Community Action Forum: Creating inclusive and diverse nonprofit organizations

In 2008, Pillar led a collaboration of the communities of London-Middlesex, Windsor-Essex and Kitchener-Waterloo to produce the Community Action Forum in October. This two-day event brought people from Southwestern Ontario together in open dialogue to discuss and strategize about creating truly inclusive and diverse nonprofits and charities. The forum's speakers were challenging, informative and stimulating and the participants left the event feeling empowered and energized in their commitment to systems change.

The Forum was funded by Canadian Heritage -Multiculturalism Program and supported by United Way of London & Middlesex.

Foundation Investment Forum

Pillar, working in close collaboration with Highstreet Asset Management, hosted the Foundation Investment Forum just as the full impact of the economic downturn was taking effect. Representatives of 23 public and private foundations met for a day-long discussion of strategy, planning and airing of concern. The day was so successful that the Forum will be repeated in 2009.

Management Tools for the Nonprofit Sector

This wildly successful collaboration between Pillar, Libro Financial Group and Fanshawe College Corporate Training continued its sold out run. Covering topics ranging from legal issues to stress management to capital campaigns, the participants have been passionate in their praise of the quality of the seminars.

Willy Van Klooster Nonprofit Governance Scholarship

In honour of Willy Van Klooster's exemplary leadership in board governance as the founding and long-serving Chair of Pillar Nonprofit Network, this scholarship is awarded annually to build the board governance capacity of senior nonprofit leaders in London and area.

In the Fall of 2008, Anne Rollings, Executive Director and myself, Lori Vanstone, President of Midwestern Adult Day Services were fortunate to be chosen as the successful recipients of the Willy Van Klooster Nonprofit Governance Scholarship. Working with Janet Frood, Executive Coach, Horizon Leadership Institute and Willy Van Klooster has enriched our partnership and helped us flourish. Willy's guidance and encouragement gave me a tremendous boost in self confidence in my performance as chair. Janet, who coached both Anne and me as a team, has been instrumental in enhancing our communication skills. Through Janet's coaching, we know we can count on each other for an honest opinion and mutual support. We now recognize that each of us is accountable for our own separate responsibilities but together we share a common vision for our agency. The entire process has strengthened our partnership and helped clarify our roles and broaden our knowledge base.
